Who Wants to Have Eternal Life?



It's funny but sometimes you can be watching the t.v. and see something that quite astonishes you. Something like this happened to me a few weeks ago. I had actually been in the other room for quite a while, catching up with some paperwork I had been putting off for ages. I had finally got round to doing it after convincing myself that it wouldn't go away, no matter how much I kept shuffling it around my desk. I had finally run out of places to hide it. So I resigned myself to the task in hand and was beginning to actually make some headway with it, when I thought, things would go even better with a cup of coffee beside me!

Of course, that was where I went wrong because I should have just carried on and not broken my train of thought. To make my cup of coffee, I had to go via the living room and to make matters worse, one of those game shows was on, where people have a chance of winning lots of money. This of course makes watching the show absolutely addictive. This time, it was the very well known programme, where contestants have a chance to win up to a million pounds by answering a series of fifteen consecutive questions which get progressively more difficult. As a result, the prize money reaches dizzy heights the further the contestant goes on.

Normally I would have not paid much notice, as the show had already started. As a result, I did not have the same emotional interest in the events, as someone would who had seen it right from the very beginning and consequently would have built up empathy for the contestants. What stopped me in my tracks, as I was hurrying through to the coffee maker in the kitchen, was a particular question that was being asked. They were at the stage where there are ten people all sitting with fingers poised on the buttons, waiting to answer a simple question where they have to put the four parts of the answer into the correct order. The fastest person to answer would be given the chance of a life changing visit to the hot seat and possible wealth beyond their wildest dreams!

The question that had randomly been selected by the computer and caught my attention was that the contestants were to rearrange the Lord's Prayer into the correct order. It looked something like this:

- A. Hallowed be thy name.
- B. Thy Kingdom come.
- C. Our Father, who art in Heaven.
- D. Thy will be done.

Oh, that's really easy! I thought and waited back for the ten seconds while everyone worked out the answer. The thought that everyone will have a chance with this one, also went through my mind.

In the next few seconds, I was to be proved almost unimaginably wrong.

The correct answer was of course, C, A, B, D. When the results came up on the scoreboard, unbelievably only *one* person had managed to successfully answer the question within the ten second time slot. It wasn't even that the other nine people had tried and just weren't quick enough with nine slower times appearing on the screen.

They hadn't even been able to complete the answer so that a score could be registered.

The large answer screen, with all the contestants' scores was totally blank apart from the one successful person who had got it right. I was absolutely stunned. The man who successfully completed the answer had taken about four seconds. He looked stunned as well. Like me, he probably thought that he wouldn't have much of a chance as everyone was bound to know this and complete the answer very quickly.

I sat down hard and tried to analyse this in my mind. The contestants were just the usual cross section of the public from all parts of the country who appear on these types of shows. They all looked over thirty and seemed knowledgeable enough in other aspects of general knowledge and culture. To put it into context, the next elimination question that came up was to sort out chronologically when four very well known soap operas that were currently being aired on British t.v. had first appeared on our screens.

All of the nine remaining contestants answered this question in less than four seconds!

I thought to myself, how sad this all was. I also wondered, how could this be? I know that in my generation, this was one of the first things I can remember learning as a very young child both at Sunday school and at



school. I would imagine that almost everyone who is over forty in this country, would be able to recite the Lord's Prayer without even having to think what the next line is, whether they are a religious person or not. It is so much a part of our life, from earliest childhood right up to present day. It is a prayer that can bring so much comfort, no matter what situation the person is in. Even for people who find it hard to pray and just cannot think what to say, or

how to find the correct words, it is just so apt and brings the Lord immediately close to a person to give them comfort when they need it most.

I felt so sad that these nine people have not experienced the comfort of knowing these sacred words or have experienced the strength and reassurance that these words can bring.

The irony about it too is that in these times of such materialism, where money and possessions seem to mean everything, where nothing is free nowadays and literally thousands of people are applying and queuing to go on these game shows to try and win a million pounds, there is a precious thing being offered to us all - to every single person in the world - a thing that costs absolutely nothing, but is so precious that it is worth more than all the money in the world. It is absolutely priceless. An offer of eternal life from our Lord Jesus Christ. People only have to accept him into their lives. Yet most of them turn their backs on this wonderful offer or simply don't want to know.

Going back to the show, you're probably wondering how this solitary gentleman got on. He actually did very well.

In many of these game shows the contestants are offered lifelines to keep them in the game. The word "lifeline" couldn't be more apt when it comes to accepting the Lord as your Saviour. On offer is a lifeline that never runs out, no matter how high the stakes are in the game of life and everyday living. He will stay close by your side, especially when you are losing. That is when you will feel him really close, giving you strength and comfort when you need it most. Your lifelines will never run out. He will never eliminate you, forget about you or disqualify you, even if you don't always win the game. Isn't it wonderful to have such a person by your side?

Who wants to have eternal life?

Fairtrade Fortnight 22 February - 7 March 2010



For this year's Fairtrade Fortnight the nation is asked to join in The Big Swap. For two whole weeks you are asked to swap your usual stuff for Fairtrade stuff. Your usual bananas for Fairtrade bananas, your usual cotton socks for Fairtrade cotton socks, and your usual cuppa for a Fairtrade cuppa. Whenever you pop to the shops, you can use your wallet to make a stand.

Swapping your usual stuff for Fairtrade stuff is a brilliantly small step to making the world a fairer place. It means that you get to show your support for developing world producers through what you buy. Two billion people - a third of humanity - survive on less than \$2 a day. Unfair trade rules keep them in poverty, but they face the global challenges of food shortages and climate change too.

Fairtrade believes that developing world producers should be in control of their own lives, by getting a better deal for the work that they do. This is a different way of doing business. It's a way that puts the poorest of the world first.

The Fairtrade range started small. Like one bar of chocolate small. Now there are over 4,500 products bearing the FAIRTRADE Mark. A glorious array of products that spans pineapples and footballs to duvets and rice.

Dear Friends,

We hope that you all had a wonderful Christmas despite the awful weather we have heard that you have had to endure, and a very Happy New Year to you all.

Thanks to the generosity of you, our friends in SA link, we were able to enable others to have a very joyous and wonderful Christmas.

On Christmas Day at Mamelodi the service was in the form of a Christmas party particularly for the children who have been orphaned by AIDS. Some of them are being looked after by grand parents, mostly widowed grandmothers, and others by the eldest sibling in the family. The problem is so vast that there are not enough facilities to assist these children.

When Alison Elliot (former Moderator of the Church of Scotland) visited us she and her husband gave us a gift which enabled the manyano (women's guild) to start a support project for these children and so enabling many of them to be fed regularly and even get into school. So with your generosity we were able to give the manyano some money to



make this party a memorable event and we even had Santa and every child was given a Christmas gift!

We were able to make Christmas wonderful for a Zimbabwean family that we have assisted personally and from money sent from Cumbernauld Old congregation on a regular basis for a number of years now. Shupi is the last surviving adult of her family; all her siblings have died of AIDS and there is only her and her elderly mother left with 9 children to care for. She travels back and forth to South Africa selling crafts and when she is in South Africa she often stays with us. Her elderly mother looks after most of the children and recently she has managed to get 3 of them into school here in SA thanks to Cumbernauld Old who have paid the fees in the past.

She usually visits us on her way back to Zimbabwe for Christmas and I phoned her to find out when she would be coming as we always try to buy her groceries to take home with her. She told me that she was unable to go home – the bus fares have doubled because of the soccer coming to SA! We were so glad to be able to tell her that she would go home for Christmas and to give her a huge food hamper to take home with her for the children. We have since heard from a friend in the UK, who sent a generous amount of money to assist refugees. We have decided to use this to pay the school fees for another year to enable the 3 children to continue their education here in SA.

A great big thank you for all your support, prayers and correspondence over the past year and we look forward to more of the same for 2010.
